SCEH, in the days of yore...

.... in the words of Sister Sosamma Vasisht

As she finishes her 36 years long tenure at SCEH, Sister Sosamma, one of the longest serving employees of the hospital, reminisces the olden days of SCEH...



I joined SCEH in January Coincidently. Dr. Cyrus Shroff and joined myself the hospital at the same time! I was a young girl limited with skills, but

managed to attract people with my friendliness. Mrs. Martin was the matron then, and she was an extremely strict lady. During our training, we were not allowed to stand next to the surgeon, instead we would view the surgery from a distant window. Even though she was a tough lady, she made sure her surgeons were happy and well fed. In break time she would boil eggs and insist that the surgeons eat. In those days, only ICCE (cataract surgery without intraocular lens) surgeries were performed. As some surgeons performed cryoextraction of cataract, 90 cases were completed in three hours. The first intraocular lens (IOL) surgery was performed by Dr. Noshir Shroff in the year 1995. A "choice case" was an interesting concept at that time. While a regular cataract surgery cost ₹100, the patient could choose to pay 3500 for a preferred surgeon. 30% of this fee came to the hospital fund and rest to the operating surgeon. As a tradition, the surgeon gave ₹10 to the assistant after this "choice case", which was used to order food for the operating theater staff. Even the concept of out patient department was very different. Before the introduction of slit lamps in the hospital, the doctors used to sit on a high chair and examine the standing patient's eye with torchlight. The registration fee was a mere rupee. How times have changed!

I am proud to have assisted all the outstanding surgeons of SCEH right from the early days of their career. I will always remember the Rs 50 that Dr. Suneeta Dubey gave to me after I assisted her in her first IOL surgery. To me and to the rest of the staff of SCEH, Dr. Minoo Shroff was like an angel. Be it a wedding or a funeral, he did not miss any event his staff invited him for. I feel blessed to have worked for him. Also, the staff was so dedicated and attached to the hospital that on days when there was no electricity, people would manually run the motor of the generator and sit with candles next to the patients, so that they don't get uncomfortable. As it was a charity hospital, the resources were always limited. To make best use of whatever we had, we used to collect remaining silicone oil left after each case and sterilize it to use for patients who couldn't afford it.

I hail from the town of Kollum in Kerala. My job here at SCEH was my first job ever; it is also my last. Very few people are fortunate enough to have a work family in addition to their real family. I have spent all my life here, and given my very best to my work every single day.



From coming at odd hours to attend to emergencies, to assisting retinal surgeries that lasted the whole day, I can say with pride, that I have done it all. However, my journey wasn't just about the good things, I did consider changing my job, but each time I landed a job interview, I didn't get leave to go. This is destiny, probably. I have always put service before self and I believe that Jesus has given me strength to serve the society.

Now, when I bid goodbye to this wonderful place, I can't help but wonder, what my life would be like if I wasn't here. All I see is a blank. There is no other place I would have rather been than here. I will miss SCEH and the people of SCEH.

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Enhancing Vision, Transforming Lives: The Impact of a Specialist Glaucoma Surgeon in Secondary Centers



At SCEH, our unwavering commitment to the eradication of preventable blindness extends far beyond the confines of our primary facility. With a network comprising six secondary hospitals strategically located in Alwar, Saharanpur, Mohammadi, Vrindavan, Ranikhet, and Meerut, we are steadfast in our mission to ensure that high-quality eye care is accessible to all.

In our country, a shortage of trained ophthalmologists and paramedics persists across the nation, exacerbated by the absence of specialized training programs, even in critical areas such as glaucoma, which is an integral part of comprehensive ophthalmology. This deficit is further compounded by a lack of emphasis on staying abreast with the latest advancements in glaucoma management.

Recognizing these challenges, SCEH has taken proactive measures to bridge the gap in glaucoma care at the grass root level. Through a collaborative effort with Orbis International, SCEH initiated the Orbis Santane Project. This groundbreaking project aims to augment wet lab infrastructure and training capacity, providing aspiring ophthalmologists with comprehensive training opportunities. Key components of the project include the utilization of advanced resources such as the Digital Training Hub, Stimulator, and animal eyes for wet lab training. A meticulously structured curriculum for glaucoma courses, coupled with a cadre of expert trainers, ensures sustainable ongoing education.

SCEH has opened avenues for residents and ophthalmologists to enroll in blended training courses. This unique program incorporates short-term training at the primary institute (SCEH) alongside remote surgical mentorships at secondary centers. The inclusion of a structured assessment of the curriculum and skills renders these programs exceptionally promising.

The decision to train doctors posted at secondary



wanted to fly...to soar. After months of convincing my father, I took my first job in Lucknow and then in Kanpur as a junior training facilitator. I wasn't surprised that I was the only woman in the whole group, but was also proud of being able to survive on my own in that male dominated atmosphere.

Just before COVID-19 struck, I applied for a job at SCEH, however the position was put on hold due to the lockdown. My world turned upside down, when I lost

my father to COVID. At this time I was at an all time low, both personally and professionally. Eventually, when the lockdown was lifted and normalcy had begun to seep in, I got a job in Bhopal. My father, who was my only support system, fighting my extended family for my dreams and aspirations, was no more and now I had to fight by myself. Despite resistance from my family, I worked in Bhopal for six months before I got a call from SCEH. It's now been three years, working as a coordinator for the Allied Ophthalmic Personnel at SCEH Mohammadi, Lakhimpur Kheri, UP, and I intend to keep it that way.

I am the only girl in the family who has a career and is living on her own but hopefully I have made it easier for other girls in the family to dream and elders in the family to accept.

SCEH supports the ones who are ready to learn. My mentors played a significant role in shaping my skills in communication, personality development, and confidence, enabling me to handle professional situations with poise and competence. I lost my father, a loss nothing can make up for, but the void I felt professionally is now slowly filling up and I can't be happier.

Mahira has been visiting SCEH for the past three years. Her family belongs to a small town near Ghaziabad. Born with glaucoma and having a challenging life since birth, Mahira has already gone through a lot.

She was born in a small hospital in a village where her parents realized that her eyes were not opening and when

they got back home they realized her eyes were white. They took her to a hospital in Modinagar where they were told that she was suffering from glaucoma. For the first few years she was treated at some other hospital before she was referred to SCEH. When she came here she could not see at all. She under went multiple surgeries both for glaucoma and cornea. Despite the surgeries and the treatment, her vision is not

restored completely, but she is now ambulatory.

Her father works at a thread reeling factory and with a big family to support, he didn't have enough money to fund all of Mahira's



surgeries. But thanks to free government schemes and the support of SCEH, he was able to give the best possible treatment to his child.

The doctors in the hospital are very attached to Mahira and everyone just loves having her in the hospital.




